

**National Right to Life Congressional Scorecard**  
**U.S. House of Representatives | 114th Congress**  
**2015-2016**

**1. No Taxpayer Funding for Abortion Act (H.R. 7) (01/22/2015, Roll Call No. 45)**

The No Taxpayer Funding for Abortion Act (H.R. 7), sponsored by Reps. Chris Smith (R-NJ) and Dan Lipinski (D-Il.), would establish a permanent, government-wide policy against funding abortions or health plans that cover abortions (except to save the life of the mother, or in cases of rape or incest). Among other things, this would remove elective abortion from the federally subsidized health plans that the Obamacare law established for millions of Americans. On January 22, 2015, the House of Representatives passed H.R. 7, 242-179. The bill was supported by 239 Republicans and three Democrats. It was opposed by one Republican and 178 Democrats. Companion legislation has been introduced in the U.S. Senate by Senator Roger Wicker (R-Ms.) as S. 582.

**2. Repeal of the Obamacare health care law (02/03/2015, Roll Call No. 58)**

H.R. 596 was a bill to repeal the 2010 "Obamacare" health care law. The measure also included a number of instructions to certain House committees regarding provisions to be included in developing a proposed replacement health care law. National Right to Life supported H.R. 596, for reasons summarized in a letter sent to U.S. House members. On February 3, 2015, the House passed the bill, 239-186. All of those voting in favor of the bill were Republicans. Voting in opposition were 183 Democrats and three Republicans (Dold of IL, Katko of NY, and Poliquin of Maine). The bill was then sent to the U.S. Senate. House roll call no. 58, February 3, 2015.

**3. To block the D.C. "Reproductive Health Non-Discrimination Act" (RHNDA) (04/30/2015, Roll Call No. 194)**

The U.S. Constitution places the District of Columbia under the exclusive legislative jurisdiction of Congress. In 2015, the District Council (city council), which operates on authority delegated by Congress, enacted a law called the "Reproductive Health Non-Discrimination Act," which prohibits employers within the District from engaging in "discrimination" on the basis of "decisions" reached by employees, or potential employees, regarding "reproductive health" matters. In a letter to the U.S. House of Representatives, NRLC said, "Under the RHNDA, using any 'decision . . . related to' abortion to inform decisions about hiring, firing, or benefits (among other things) would expose our organization both to enforcement actions by the District government bureaucracy, and to private lawsuits," and characterized the RHNDA as "a politically motivated attack on our organization and the other organizations that seek to vindicate the human rights of unborn children." NRLC urged House members

to approve H. J. Res. 43, introduced by Rep. Diane Black (R-Tn.), to prevent the RHNDA from taking effect. On April 30, 2015, the House approved the NRL-backed resolution by a vote of 228 to 192. On this roll call, 225 Republicans and three Democrats voted aye (pro-life), while 13 Republicans and 179 Democrats voted nay (pro-abortion). Roll Call No. 194. However, the U.S. Senate did not act on the matter, and the RHNDA went into effect. See also roll call no. 12 in this scorecard.

#### **4. Motion to add open-ended "health" exception to 20-week abortion ban (05/13/2015, Roll Call No. 222)**

This is a roll call on a motion/amendment to add open-ended "health" exception (including emotional "health") to the Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act (H.R. 36). National Right to Life strongly opposed this motion/amendment, which failed, 181-246. The motion was supported by 181 Democrats. It was opposed by 243 Republicans and three Democrats. May 13, 2015, Roll Call No. 222. Following the defeat of this pro-abortion motion/amendment, the House proceeded immediately to a vote on final passage of H.R. 36, which appears in this scorecard as roll call no. 5.

#### **5. Passage of Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act (20-week abortion ban) (05/13/2015, Roll Call No. 223)**

Passage of the bill that would prohibit abortions in cases where the probable age of the fetus is 20 weeks or later and would impose criminal penalties on doctors who violate the ban. It would provide exceptions for cases in which the woman's life is in danger as well as for pregnancies that are a result of rape if, as amended, for pregnancies that are a result of rape against an adult woman, the woman received counseling or medical treatment for the rape at least 48 hours prior to the abortion. An exception would be provided for pregnancies resulting from rape or incest against a minor if the rape or incest had been previously reported to law enforcement or another government agency authorized to act on reports of child abuse. As amended, the bill would require a second doctor trained in neonatal resuscitation to be present for abortions where the fetus has the "potential" to survive outside the womb, and, if the fetus is born alive, the bill would require that the infant be provided medical care and immediately be transported and admitted to a hospital. As amended, women wishing to have abortions under the bill's exceptions would need to sign (along with the doctor and a witness) an informed consent authorization form detailing the age of the fetus and stating that, if born alive, would be given medical assistance and transported to a hospital.

#### **6. Passage of the Defund Planned Parenthood Act (09/18/2015, Roll Call No. 505)**

Defund Planned Parenthood Act of 2015 (H.R. 3134), sponsored by Rep. Diane Black (R-Tn.), would have prohibited any federal funds from going to the Planned Parenthood Federation of America (PPFA), or any PPFA affiliate, for a period of one year from the date of enactment, except upon certification that no abortions will be performed by these entities (except when necessary to prevent the death of the mother, or in cases of rape or incest). NRLC strongly supported H.R. 3134. On September 18, 2015, the House of Representatives passed H.R. 3134 by a vote of 241-187, with one House member voting "present." The bill was supported by 239 Republicans and two Democrats. It was opposed by three Republicans and 184 Democrats. House roll call no. 505. (The Senate companion bill is S. 1836, sponsored by Sen. James Lankford, R-Ok.)

#### **7. Passage of the Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act (09/18/2015, Roll Call No. 506)**

The Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act (H.R. 3504), sponsored by Congressman Trent Franks (R-Az.), would enact an explicit requirement that a baby born alive during an abortion must be afforded "the same degree" of care that would apply "to any other child born alive at the same gestational age," including transportation to a hospital. In addition, the bill applies the existing penalties of 18 U.S.C. Sec. 1111 (the federal murder statute) to anyone who performs "an overt act that kills a child born alive." The bill also empowers women with a right to sue their abortionists and

others for harm caused by violations of the act. On September 18, 2015, the House of Representatives passed the Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act, 248-177, with one House member voting "present." The bill was supported by 243 Republicans and five Democrats. It was opposed by 177 Democrats. House roll call no. 506.

**8. Womens Public Health and Safety Act (Medicaid state flexibility) (09/29/2015, Roll Call No. 524)**

The Women's Public Health and Safety Act (H.R. 3495), sponsored by Congressman Sean Duffy (R-Wi.), was a bill to amend federal law to clarify that states may, at their option, exclude abortion providers from the federal-state Medicaid program (other than those that provide abortions only in cases of life of the mother, rape, or incest). National Right to Life supported this legislation. The bill passed, 236 to 193. It was supported by 234 Republicans and two Democrats. It was opposed by nine Republicans and 184 Democrats. September 29, 2015, House roll call no. 524. Following House approval, H.R. 3495 was sent to the U.S. Senate, which did not act on it.

**9. Initial approval of pro-life reconciliation bill (defund Planned Parenthood) (10/23/2015, Roll Call No. 568)**

On October 23, 2015, the House of Representatives passed the *Restoring Americans' Healthcare Freedom Reconciliation Act* (H.R. 3762), also known as the "pro-life budget reconciliation bill." (A "budget reconciliation bill" qualifies for special fast-track treatment, and may not be filibustered in the U.S. Senate.) This bill contained language that would block, for one year, roughly 89% of all federal funds to Planned Parenthood. The bill would also have repealed some provisions of Obamacare, including the "excess benefits tax," which would lead to rationing of lifesaving medical care. To read NRLC's letter to the House in support of the bill, click [here](#). The roll call on H.R. 3762 was 240 to 189. The bill was supported by 239 Republicans and one Democrat. It was opposed by seven Republicans and 182 Democrats. House roll call no. 568. The bill was subsequently passed, with some additional provisions, by the U.S. Senate, but it was vetoed by President Obama, and supporters could not muster the required two-thirds margin required to override that veto.

**10. Reconciliation bill to defund Planned Parenthood, repeal Obamacare provisions (01/06/2016, Roll Call No. 6)**

On January 6, 2016, the House of Representatives approved the final version of the *Restoring Americans' Healthcare Freedom Reconciliation Act* (H.R. 3762), or "budget reconciliation bill." The House had initially approved this bill on October 23, 2015, but the Senate subsequently added provisions, making it necessary for the House to vote again on the legislation. In its final amended form, this bill would have repealed (in two years) numerous provisions of Obamacare, including the program that provides tax subsidies to about 1,000 health plans that cover elective abortion. In addition, the bill would have blocked most (about \$400 million) of the federal funding that goes to Planned Parenthood. National Right to Life strongly supported passage of the bill, which passed by a vote of 240 to 181. The bill was supported (pro-life vote) by 239 Republicans and one Democrat. It was opposed (pro-abortion vote) by three Republicans and 178 Democrats (pro-abortion). The bill was then sent to President Obama, who vetoed it (see below). Roll call no. 6, January 6, 2016.

**11. Vetoed reconciliation bill to defund Planned Parenthood, repeal Obamacare provisions (02/02/2016, Roll Call No. 53)**

On February 2, 2016, the House of Representatives voted on whether to override President Obama's veto of the *Restoring Americans' Healthcare Freedom Reconciliation Act* (H.R. 3762), the "pro-life budget reconciliation bill." The bill would have repealed (in two years) numerous provisions of Obamacare, including the program that provides tax subsidies to about 1,000 health plans that cover elective abortion. In addition, the bill would have blocked most (about \$400 million) federal funding to Planned Parenthood for one year. National Right to Life strongly supported

passage of the bill. The tally was 241 votes in favor of overriding the veto, and 186 opposed, which was 44 votes short of the two-thirds margin required to override. Therefore, the bill died. On this roll call, 240 Republicans voted to override, while three voted to sustain the veto (Reps. Hanna and Katko of New York, and Rep. Dold of Illinois). One Democrat (Rep. Peterson of Minnesota) voted to override, and 183 Democrats voted to sustain. Roll call no. 53, February 2, 2016.

### **12. Congressional control over District of Columbia funds (abortion, etc.) (05/25/2016, Roll Call No. 248)**

The U.S. Constitution says that Congress shall "exercise exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever" with respect to the seat of the federal government, the District of Columbia. Part of this congressional oversight is a requirement that all public funds expended by local District officials (the mayor, etc.) must be appropriated by Congress, including funds raised by local taxes. For many years, Congress has placed limits on how such funds may be spent, including a prohibition on funding elective abortions. However, District officials have enacted a local "budget autonomy" law that they insist gives them the right to spend these "local" funds without congressional approval (about \$8 billion annually). H.R. 5233, sponsored by Rep. Mark Meadows (R-NC), would reaffirm that Congress retains complete authority over these funds. In [a letter to members of the House of Representatives in support of the bill](#), dated May 24, 2016, National Right to Life said, "If the local authorities are permitted to illegal seize control of the \$8 billion, it is predictable that they will soon pay for abortion on demand . . . [and] we can expect more assaults by District officials against pro-life and other conservative groups that are based in the District." The House passed H.R. 5233 by a vote of 240 to 179, and sent it to the U.S. Senate. The bill was supported by 238 Republicans and two Democrats. It was opposed by 179 Democrats. House roll call no. 248, May 25, 2016.

### **13. Tax-subsidized abortion on demand for federal employees (07/06/2016, Roll Call No. 364)**

During consideration of the Financial Services appropriations bill for Fiscal Year 2017 (H.R. 5485), pro-abortion Rep. Alan Grayson (D-Fl.) offered an amendment to remove from the bill a provision that prohibits the Federal Employees Health Benefits program from offering health plans that cover elective abortion. This pro-life provision, referred to as the "Smith Amendment," has been carried on the annual appropriations bill for many years. The Grayson Amendment failed, 177 to 245. The Grayson Amendment was supported by 176 Democrats and one Republican; these 177 House members voted to allow tax-subsidized health plans to cover abortion on demand for about 10 million federal employees and their dependants. The amendment was defeated by the votes of 238 Republicans and seven Democrats. July 7, 2016, House roll call no. 364.

### **14. To block the D.C. "Reproductive Health Non-Discrimination Act" (RHNDA) (07/07/2016, Roll Call No. 390)**

The U.S. Constitution places the District of Columbia under the exclusive legislative jurisdiction of Congress. In 2015, the District Council (city council), which operates on authority delegated by Congress, enacted a law called the "Reproductive Health Non-Discrimination Act" (RHNDA), which prohibits employers within the District from engaging in "discrimination" on the basis of "decisions" reached by employees, or potential employees, regarding "reproductive health" matters. In [a letter to the U.S. House of Representatives](#), NRLC said, "Under the RHNDA, using any 'decision . . . related to' abortion to inform decisions about hiring, firing, or benefits (among other things) would expose our organization both to enforcement actions by the District government bureaucracy, and to private lawsuits," and characterized the RHNDA as "a politically motivated attack on our organization and the other organizations that seek to vindicate the human rights of unborn children." On July 7, 2016, during consideration of the Financial Services appropriations bill for Fiscal Year 2017, pro-life Rep. Gary Palmer (R-Al.) offered an NRLC-backed amendment to impede District officials from expending funds to enforce the RHNDA. The Palmer Amendment passed, 223-192. This pro-life amendment was supported by 221 Republicans and two Democrats. It was opposed by 178 Democrats and 14 Republicans. Roll call no. 390. See also roll calls no. 3 and no. 12 in this scorecard.

**15. Conscience Protection Act (07/13/2016, Roll Call No. 443)**

On July 13, 2016, the House of Representatives passed the Conscience Protection Act, a bill strongly supported by National Right to Life. This bill would strengthen federal conscience protections for health care providers, who face the increasingly frequent use of coercion by various state governments to compel participation in providing abortion. The bill would prohibit any level of government from discriminating against health care providers, including doctors, nurses, hospitals, and insurers, who decline to participate in abortions. In addition, it would empower victims to seek relief in federal court for violations of the federal conscience laws. It was supported by 242 Republicans and three Democrats, opposed by one Republican and 181 Democrats. The House inserted the Conscience Protection Act into a bill that originally dealt with a different subject, S. 304, and passed it under that number, but the text is the same as H.R. 4828, sponsored by Rep. John Fleming (R-La.). Similar provisions also were contained in H.R. 940, sponsored by Rep. Diane Black (R-Tn.). The Conscience Protection Act has been introduced in the Senate by Senator James Lankford (R-Ok.) as S. 2927. Roll call no. 443.
